Context

The Land Registers Interconnection (LRI) project aims to provide a single access point within the European e-Justice Portal to the land registers of participating EU countries. This will address the current issues of discrepancy, complexity and multitude of land registration systems amongst Member States. Through this access point citizens and professionals will be able to query and retrieve relevant information via a single, adaptive, multi-lingual interface, in compliance with the national legal and technical capabilities.



LRI project status

 Phase I is available for integration testing with Member States since December 2017, at contractor's Demo site (multilingual):

- -> Registers Land Registers Interconnection (LRI)
- Phase II will feature an authentication and authorization mechanism
- Austria and Estonia already connected to LRI
- Spain, Portugal, Latvia and Hungary started the interconnection work accompanied by AT and EE



Collaboration with ELRA

- ELRA aims to finalize the ELRD in project IMOLA III
- Supporting the adoption by Member States of the ELRD standard for facilitating LR document exchanges
- Link to IMOLA I-KOS visualization page to be added on the European e-Justice Portal



Central payment solution

- New call for tender to be launched for contracting a Payment Services Provider
- VAT: Tax Calculation Module (TCM) ready Q3 2020 Member States to upload their VAT regimes
- Invoicing: Member State survey for BRIS shows a wide preference for the following option: e-Justice Portal gathers the invoicing information from the Land Registers, generates the invoice on their behalf, and delivers it to the user.



Distributed payment solution

- LRI redirects the users to the payment providers of the Member States
- The shopping basket can contain documents from several Member States, but the checkout and payment will be done individually for each Member State
- The Member States calculate VAT based on data provided by the user on the e-Justice Portal
- Invoices delivered by the Member States



User authentication and authorization

- Single Sign-On as preferred solution
- AT Identity Provider implemented as a first step towards eIDAS compatibility
- Integration with EE Professional Authentication Service according to the existing LRI specifications
